

Tirector's Mote

My history with "The Pirates of Penzance" goes back to the early 1960's when I got to see the Doyly Carte Company do the show on tour and I watched an episode of "Car 54, Where are You?" in which the hapless Bronx cops sang "A Policeman's Lot is Not a Happy One." I could not have guessed that such a beginning would lead to decades of close involvement with this show, and with G&S in general.

It is, to date, the operetta I have directed most frequently (this is lucky number 4!) and it never strikes me as less than fresh and inspired. Indeed, after a performing career during which I have done a wide selection of pieces, from medieval pageants to modern opera premieres, "Pirates" even more than previously strikes me as a happy conjunction of wit, goofiness, tunefulness and sheer craft.

Which goes a long way towards explaining why I saw no reason to update, revise or "improve" any of it. We have even set it during the actual year of its famous double premiere, 1879. I say double, because there was a copyright-necessitated English premiere before the official opening in New York City. It has perhaps the most famous of all the patter songs ("A Modern Major General"), the original version of "Hail, Hail the Gang's All Here," the previously mentioned "A Policemans's Lot" and the beautiful love duet "Ah, Leave Me Not to Pine." Both the men and women of the ensemble have plenty to do. It's not too long and not too short.

One word to the wary, though. At one point poor Frederick says to Mabel, his beloved, that he will come back to her in 1940. For that original audience, back in 1879, this was over 60 years in the future. One can have fun speculating on what he might have done during all that time. Perhaps he transferred allegiances to a slightly later band of pirates inhabiting Neverland.

ACT I

The coast of Cornwall in the late 1870s. A band of pirates raises a toast to the young apprentice Frederic, whose indentures are expiring now that he is 21. Frederic's former nursemaid Ruth recounts how he was first apprenticed. Taking advantage of how Frederic has never beheld another woman, the pirates encourage him to marry the middle-aged Ruth and take her with him when he leaves. Although duty binds Frederic to the pirates until noon, he announces that his duty thereafter will be to exterminate his former comrades, as he abhors their trade despite his personal fondness for them. He offers the parting advice that their compassion for fellow orphans has hampered their piracy. Bidding Frederic farewell, the Pirate King praises the swashbuckling life. Alone with Ruth, Frederic asks if she is beautiful, and she affirms that she has been called so. But no sooner does he agree to wed her than a bevy of young women approaches. Seeing their youthful beauty, Frederic denounces Ruth for deceiving him and sends her away. He hides while the ladies, a group of sisters, arrive on the beach. When Frederic reveals his presence, the ladies rebuff his plea that one of them love him, but one more sister, the strong-willed Mabel, appears and claims his hand and heart. Frederic cautions that his former mates are still in the vicinity. Sure enough, the pirates spring upon them, claiming the women as their brides. The ladies protest that they are the daughters of Major-General Stanley, who promptly appears. A confused argument ensues,

but the Major-General gains the pirates' sympathy by claiming (falsely) to be an orphan. The Pirate King avows his men's more sensitive natures and releases the captives—to the merriment of all but Ruth, who bursts in to plead with an unrelenting Frederic.

ACT II

A ruined chapel on Major-General Stanley's estate.

Although he regrets having deceived the pirates, the Major-General approves Frederic's plan to lead the local policemen against the band. Before Frederic can join them, however, the Pirate King and Ruth confront him with a technicality that binds him to their gang: His contract stipulates his twenty-first birthday, but Frederic was born on February 29th in a leap year, meaning that he has had only five. Ever the slave of duty, Frederic divulges Major-General Stanley's deception, prompting the Pirate King to swear vengeance. Frederic tells Mabel he must rejoin the pirates, and the lovers share a tearful goodbye. Despite her feelings for Frederic, Mabel commands the reluctant policemen to proceed with the plan of attack. When the battle breaks out, the pirates quickly overtake the officers. But the Police Sergeant wins their mercy by appealing to a higher power, and Ruth makes a surprising revelation that allows the pirates to wed the Major-General's daughters. Frederic and Mabel reunite, and everyone is joyfully paired.



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
